Title: Advent 1 - When the King Comes: Crisis

Introduction:

Do you ever wonder why the world is as it is? Why is there such violence and evil in a world where, at Advent time, Christians celebrate the coming of the Prince of Peace? The Bok of Revelation was written to Christians in the first century, who were asking exactly that question. The answer comes to them in the form of 'Apocalyptic' writing, full of bizarre images, symbolic numbers and fantastic events. The intention is to reveal (that's what apocalypse means) how the events in heaven are affecting life on earth, and how our lives on earth also affect the heavens!

Review:

Satan (the Beast) has always been opposed to God's purposes. He has many guises (10 heads) and limited authority (many crowns). Having failed to prevent the birth of Jesus (v5) by oppressing Israel (the agonised woman of v1), he tries to kill the child (Jesus) (v4). The child is however snatched from him in Resurrection power (5) and so the Beast turns his attention to the child's people (the woman). Again however he is unsuccessful since they are protected (6) in their time of waiting in the wilderness. Having lost any authority in the heavenly places (9) the Beast is still possession of power to harm God's people (9,12) during their life on earth. There calling is to stay true to Christ, even to the point of death (11). The Beast still comes against Christians whether in the form of militancy and persecution, or in the more subtle forms that experience in the West, dressed as an angel of light I the clothes of our culture (consumerism, materialism, individualism etc).
