Title: Saved by the Blood of the Lamb

Introduction: This talk connected the saving effect of the lamb slain by the familes in Egypt at the time of the first Passover, to the life and death of Jesus.

Review: Invite one or more who have heard the talk to give their own brief review.

Read: Exodus 12:1-40 (it's a long reading but gives you the sweep of the events of that dramatic night).

Reflect :

- Why does God tell Israel to reset its calendar from this point (12:1)? What effect would that have on them when they celebrated 'New Year'?
 - In what sense do people in the group feel that their 'calendar was reset' when they came to Christ?
- Try, just for a minute, to forget everything you know about the rest of the story, and about Jesus as the 'lamb of God'. If you had been given the instructions in vs 3-11, what questions would have formed in your mind?
 - Would eating a lamb and painting its blood on your house seem an obvious way to be saved from God's activity in this tenth plague?
 - \circ What does this tell us about 'Jesus the Lamb of God' (1 Corinthians 5:7)?
- Unleavened bread (Exodus 17:12-20) became a symbol of purification. Leaven (yeast) became a symbol for sin (it just grows and grows!) and Passover was always preceded by a scrupulous search for and disposal of any leaven that there might be in the house.
 - What lesson might there be for Christians in this ritual associated with Passover?
- Isaiah 53 is an extended prophecy about the work of Jesus, 'led like a lamb to the slaughter'. Divide your group into four and give each sub-group a part of Isaiah 53 (53:1-3; 53:4-6; 53:7-9; 53:10-12). Ask each sub-group to reflect on their verses, and identify ways in which the prophecy about Jesus, fulfils the role of the Passover lamb in Exodus 12.

- The Passover meal was to become a perpetual reminder to Israel (12:17). Jesus celebrated the Passover meal when he took his 'last supper' with his disciples (Mark 14:12).
 - How much of the Passover meaning is retained in the Christian act of taking Holy Communion?
 - Are there ways in which the background of Passover enrich taking bread and wine for group members?
 - When people take Holy Communion, what thoughts and images feed their minds? Does Passover add anything?
- Close with a time of prayer, thanking God for the Passover lamb, Jesus Christ.

And finally:

As you conclude, ask each person:

- What is the main thing you are taking away as an action point?
- How can we pray for you?
- Is there anything we can check on next time we meet?
